

Get out the Vote in **New York**

Why should you vote?

Voting is one of the most powerful ways to make your voice heard in our democracy, but in 2016, 43% of the eligible voting-age population (nearly 100 million Americans) did not cast a vote for president; and 38.6% did not vote for any office.

In 2016, the Black voter turnout rate declined for the first time in 20 years in a presidential election, falling from a recordhigh 66.6% in 2012 to 59.6% in 2016.

New York's absentee and mail-in voting procedures

Permanent absentee / mail-in voting procedures:

Excuse required to request an absentee ballot

2020 state absentee / mail-in voting status:

Coronavirus updates: Voters in the November 3, 2020, general election can cite concerns over COVID-19 as a valid excuse for voting absentee.

Election Day: November 3



Deadlines to know for voting in New York

Voter registration deadline:

October 9, 2020

Twenty-five days before an election. Absentee / Mail-In voting ballot deadlines:

Request must be received by

October 27, 2020

Seven days before the election

Ballot submission deadline:

By mail: Postmarked by November 2, 2020 and received by November 10, 2020.

In person: Must be received by close of polls on Election Day.

Voter ID Requirements

NO ID REQUIRED FOR MOST VOTERS.

FOR FIRST-TIME VOTERS IN A FEDERAL ELECTION: Voter registration requires,

in this order:

number

- If haven't provided above · Current driver's license information number or
 - Photo ID or
 - Last 4 digits of social security number or State-assigned unique
- Copy of utility bill, bank statement, paycheck or government document including check*
- * shows voter's name and address
